



BOOK CLUB TO MEET ON THE 5th WEDNESDAY IN NOVEMBER ON NOVEMBER 30th AT 5:30 PM: READING ONE OF TWO NEW BOOKS

Having finished Colson Whitehead’s novel, *The Underground Railroad* at the October meeting, the Book



Club is set to begin a new book at its November meeting on Wednesday, November 30th at 5:30 pm at the Rectory. The question, of course, is which book? Two books are under consideration. The first is Patrick Phillips’ book about how all African-Americans were driven out of Forsyth County Georgia in 1912, *Blood at the Root: A Racial Cleansing in America*. The second is Ann Patchett’s latest novel about how an unwelcome guest at a christening resulted in fractured and blended families, *Commonwealth*. Book Club members are currently deciding which to read. Stay tuned and expect a decision in early November. Until then here are the publishers’ blurbs!

For *Blood at the Root: A Racial Cleansing in America*:

“Forsyth County, Georgia, at the turn of the twentieth century was home to a large African American community that included ministers and teachers, farmers and field hands, tradesmen, servants, and children. Many black residents were poor sharecroppers, but others owned their own farms and the

land on which they'd founded the county's thriving black churches.

“But then in September of 1912, three young black laborers were accused of raping and murdering a white girl. One man was dragged from a jail cell and lynched on the town square, two teenagers were hung after a one-day trial, and soon bands of white “night riders” launched a coordinated campaign of arson and terror, driving all 1,098 black citizens out of the county. In the wake of the expulsions, whites harvested the crops and took over the livestock of their former neighbors, and quietly laid claim to “abandoned” land. The charred ruins of homes and churches disappeared into the weeds, until the people and places of black Forsyth were forgotten.

“National Book Award finalist Patrick Phillips tells Forsyth's tragic story in vivid detail and traces its long history of racial violence all the way back to antebellum Georgia. Recalling his own childhood in the 1970s and '80s, Phillips sheds light on the communal crimes of his hometown and the violent means by which locals kept Forsyth “all white” well into the 1990s.

“*Blood at the Root* is a sweeping American tale that spans the Cherokee removals of the 1830s, the hope and promise of Reconstruction, and the crushing injustice of Forsyth's racial cleansing. With bold storytelling and lyrical prose, Phillips breaks a century-long silence and uncovers a history of racial terrorism that continues to shape America in the twenty-first century.”

For *Commonwealth*:

“The acclaimed, bestselling author, Ann Patchett—winner of the PEN/Faulkner Award and the Orange Prize—tells the enthralling story of how an unexpected romantic encounter irrevocably changes two families' lives.


“One Sunday afternoon in Southern California, Bert Cousins shows up at Franny Keating's christening party uninvited. Before evening falls, he has kissed Franny's mother, Beverly—thus setting in motion the dissolution of their marriages and the joining of two families.

“Spanning five decades, *Commonwealth* explores how this chance encounter reverberates through the lives of the four parents and six children involved. Spending summers together in Virginia, the Keating and Cousins children forge a lasting bond that is based on a shared disillusionment with their parents and the strange and genuine affection that grows up between them.

“When, in her twenties, Franny begins an affair with the legendary author Leon Posen and tells him about her family, the story of her siblings is no longer hers to control. Their childhood becomes the basis for his wildly successful book, ultimately forcing them to come to terms with their losses, their guilt, and the deeply loyal connection they feel for one another.

“Told with equal measures of humor and heartbreak, *Commonwealth* is a meditation on inspiration, interpretation, and the ownership of stories. It is a brilliant and tender tale of the far-reaching ties of love and responsibility that bind us together.”



WHEN GOD COMES DOWN: ADVENT SERIES ON THURSDAYS BEGINNING DECEMBER 1ST AT 5:30 PM

Come on Thursdays at 5:30 pm during Advent and Christmas week for the 2016 Advent Program: *When God Comes Down*. The five sessions will begin on Thursday, December 1st at 5:30 pm with a celebration of Holy Eucharist in the chapel and a simple soup and bread supper and the program will follow in the Library. During Advent 2 & 3, while the Rector is on vacation, there will be Evening Prayer instead of Eucharist. The Rev. Dcn. Dorothy Pierce will lead all the sessions.

When God Comes Down is a five-week study, providing one lesson for each week of Advent and one for Christmas. Each lesson includes a key Scripture, a brief reflection, discussion/reflection questions, a brief prayer, and a focus for the coming week. In this study, the Rev. James A Harnish explores the meaning of the incarnation...God with us in human flesh.

Often our Advent/Christmas journey is focused on us – our memories, feelings, relationships and experiences. This study puts the focus on God's action in Jesus Christ. It encourages participants to think more deeply in terms of the biblical, theological, and spiritual meaning of the Nativity and to apply it to their own lives.

The study looks at the stories of the primary biblical characters in the birth stories through whose lives the miracle of incarnation happened: Zechariah, Elizabeth, Joseph, Mary, and Jesus. Harnish also looks at a traditional character in nativity plays, one who is not mentioned in the Bible, the innkeeper. Through all these characters, he helps us claim for ourselves the reality of God's presence with us.

James A. Harnish is the author of numerous books and Bible studies, including *A Disciple's Path*, *Strength for the Broken Places*, *Simple Rules for Money*, and *You Only Have to Die*. He is an acclaimed pastor and ordained elder in The United Methodist Church who has led congregations throughout Florida, most recently Hyde Park in Tampa where he served for twenty-two years. In 2014, after forty-two years of active ministry, he retired from full-time ministry and moved to Winter Haven, Florida, where he lives with his wife, Marsha, and enjoys writing, reading, and playing with his grandchildren.

**JUMP START ALL SAINTS': THE FUTURE OF ALL SAINTS'
DISCUSSION ON DECEMBER 3rd-4th
EVERYONE IS INVITED TO JOIN THE DISCUSSION**

THE FUTURE OF ALL SAINTS' DISCUSSION

In April, Mother Chris, Judy Horton, and I attended a meeting called “Jump Start CNY” hosted by the Diocese of CNY. At this meeting, we had some presentations and discussions about Episcopal Churches in our diocese as well as nationally. The goal of this conference was to help parishes have ‘A QUICK SELF ANALYSIS TOOL TO HELP CONGREGATIONS FIND THE FIRE IN THEIR BELLY TO CHART A NEW COURSE’.

Some of the suggestions for how to do this included: showing a line graph depicting the Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) over the last 10 years at All Saints; charting what percent of the dollars given to All Saints comes from people in certain age groups; finding out how do we overcome the fear of change in our parish; examining seven ways to start the recasting of building assets; realizing that fear freezes finding solutions.

I have been reporting to the Vestry of All Saints as well as soliciting their input on some of the covered materials. In particular, we have talked about things that they feel are unchangeable about All Saints and what are the sacred cows in our church. The Vestry feels that it is time to involve the parish since many of the topics will have an impact on our future as a church. On December 3 and 4 I will present what was covered at the conference as well as ask for your input. This will occur during the services and will be in place of the sermon since Mother Chris will be away that weekend. I feel that this is an important discussion and urge every parishioner to attend. Please come and be part of the conversation!

SEPTEMBER 2016

All Saints' 2016 budget—it is not a balanced budget. It is once again a “faith-based” budget. In other words, it will require faith to create \$14,524 more income for 2016 for operating expenses than budgeted. The need for \$ 14,524 in “Faith Income” for 2016 is primarily due to pledge income remaining flat and expenses which have increased about 6%. (Compare 2016 with 59 pledges for a total of \$129,454 to 2015 with 56 pledges for a total of \$126,226). In 2016 a monthly income of \$15,506 will be needed to balance the expenses.


As *Crossways* goes to press before the most recent monthly bank statements and parish financial statements are prepared, “Dollars & Cents” provides information for the previous month: in this case September 2016 for the October issue of *Crossways*. 
