Dear Friends in Christ.

I'm baaaaaack! Yes, indeed, and feeling fresh and





recharged—just in time for one of the busiest times of the Church and parish year! The above are two of the icons which I "wrote" (painted) during my time away when I returned stateside. As an iconographer I am still on a steep learning curve. I am not ready for primetime. But learning the process taught me one important thing: we humans always narrow the divine. Unlike much of painting in Western art where the perspective point is somewhere on the painting, in iconography the perspective point is the viewer or the iconographer. Therefore, the perception of the divine narrows as it approaches we human creatures. We humans, in fact, only grasp a tiny point of the divine. That's something to contemplate as we enter faithfully span of the liturgical time from All Saints' weekend through Christ the King/aka Last Sunday after Pentecost and into Advent. That's something to contemplate as we move from Stewardship season into Christmas.

Our parish calendar in November gets off to a roaring start with the Hawaiian Holiday Cabaret on November 4th (at 7 pm) the same weekend as we celebrate our patronal feast All Saints'—all saints past, present and yet to come—during liturgies on Saturday November 4th at 5 pm and Sunday, November 5th at 10 am. (Please keep in mind also that one must set one's clocks back Saturday evening on the 4th to wake up in Eastern Standard Time rather than Eastern Daylight Savings Time!) Next comes the Vestry meeting on November 8th at 6:30 pm, followed by the Diocesan Convention November 10-11th in Liverpool, NY (All Saints' delegates are Bob Steber and Linda Barkman) as well weekend celebrations of Eucharist on Saturday and Sunday. The next weekend, in addition to weekend services, there is the Johnson City Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service on Sunday, November 19th. A celebration of Holy Eucharist will be held on Thanksgiving Day, November 23rd. Christ the King weekend—the end of the liturgical year—with celebrations of Holy Eucharist on November 25 at 5 pm and November 26th at 10 am is followed by the first Advent program, "Faithful: Christmas Through the Eyes of Joseph", on Thursday, November 30th at 5 pm. Throughout all this worship and activity, the Sunday School will meet each Sunday, the CHOW Pantry will be open Monday-Thursday mornings at 10 am, Cub Scouts will continue to meet on Monday evenings, the Boy Scouts will meet on Tuesday evenings, and Soup & Sandwiches will feed a lunch every Saturday at 12 noon to all who come to our door!

NAMES FOR ALL SAINTS' SUNDAY



ADVENT PROGRAM BEGINS THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 30th at 5 PM: "FAITHFUL: CHRISTMAS THROUGH THE EYES OF JOSEPH"

Yes Advent doesn't officially begin until the Vigil for Advent 1 on December 2nd. But Christmas Eve is Sunday, December 24th and that would mean there are only three Thursdays in Advent: one short for a 4 session Advent program! Which means in order to have four sessions, the Advent program will begin on Thursday, November 30th at 5 PM. Each Thursday we'll gather in the chapel for a Taize Eucharist at 5 pm and then move into the Library for a simple sup supper and the program.

This year's Advent program will feature Adam Hamilton's series "Faithful: Christmas Through the Eyes of Joseph." From his beginnings as a humble carpenter to his all-important role as the earthly father of Jesus Christ, Joseph's place in the nativity story is sometimes overlooked but contains valuable lessons for all of us. Absent from much of the biblical narrative, Joseph never spoke a word, but his courageous actions were crucial to the birth of Christ and God's salvation plan for humanity.

With the Rev. Hamilton's 4-part series we will understand how Joseph's story is much like our own. In life, we encounter circumstances that we would never have chosen for ourselves. At times it can be tempting just to walk away. Joseph provides us a great example of humbly obeying God even when we don't understand and faithfully moving forward in the strength that God provides. SEPTEMBER 2017

All Saints' 2017 budget is a deficit budget that will require using \$10,973 from previous years' income equity surpluses and/or special gifts to balance the budget. Some of this gap is the result of having fewer pledges: 56 pledges in 2017 and 59 pledges in 2016. The rest is due to small increases in expenses.


In 2017, a monthly income of \$ 14,702 will be necessary to meet operating expense cash flow. This will be difficult to do as the projected income is only approximately \$13,643 per month and All Saints' major fundraising events and fundraising income occur during May, June, September and November. It can be expected that the Vestry will decide to use available surplus funds from other years for cash flow.

Therefore, it will be more important than ever to keep one's pledge up-to-date and to make additional gifts if possible. Truly, with "God all things are possible" (Mt. 19:26).

Dear People of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York,

Our diocese is in a moment of opportunity. Many of our congregations are excited to connect our lives more deeply to God and our neighbors amidst the cultural shifts taking place in American society. We feel a deep yearning to preserve our traditions while sharing the love of Jesus with our neighbors and friends, and we're seeking the energy and the resources to do it. The Holy Spirit is giving us a persistent hope that as Episcopal Christians our unique expression of the Gospel is of enormous value to our suffering world.

Now is the time to answer the call of the Spirit, to follow our deep yearnings and our persistent hope. Beginning with Convention this November, our diocese will begin a new journey of faithful discernment that will continue into 2018 and beyond. We will be discovering new ways of partnering with God and walking with one another to discover the unique story God wants to tell through the people and congregations of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York. Central to this journey of prayer, learning and discovery is the Learning Communities initiative with Dwight Zscheile (author of *The Agile Church: Spirit-Led Innovation in an Uncertain Age*) and his colleague Michael Binder. Beginning in 2018, and led by a diocesan team of laypersons and clergy working closely with Dwight and Michael, the Learning Communities initiative will bring together leadership teams from congregations throughout our diocese to pray, learn, act and reflect.

As you already know, at our 149th Convention in November, Dwight's keynote address will speak to new and faithful approaches to our challenges and offer ideas, inspiration and tools that leaders can bring back to our congregations. But it is crucial that this is not a "one and done" moment. The Learning Communities initiative offers the opportunity to turn the inspiration of Convention into transformative action in your community.

I invite you, the leaders of our congregations, to learn more about the Learning Communities initiative and consider participating in it. More specifically, I ask every vestry in our diocese to add this initiative to an upcoming vestry meeting agenda in October or November, and to discuss your congregation's possible participation. To aid in your discussions, please review

the attached information about the initiative, which describes what your congregation can expect to get out of the process and what your commitment entails. I also encourage you to visit cnyepiscopal.org/learning-communities where you can watch a video of our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry interviewing Dwight Zscheile. Last, you are invited to a special luncheon with Dwight and the diocesan Learning Communities leadership team at Convention on Saturday, November 11th, where you can ask questions and learn more about the initiative. There is no need to make a final decision about your congregation's participation at this point; 2018 workshop dates and other details are still forthcoming. Please take every opportunity to learn about and discuss the initiative now. The vestry of each congregation has until December 15th to make a decision and sign up at cnyepiscopal.org/learning-communities.

We are the people of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York. God has brought us together for a reason, and we are part of God's new, unfolding story in this time and place. I look forward to discovering that story with you in the months and years ahead. Many blessings to you.

What is a Learning Community?

A learning community is a group of congregations who commit to one another in a nine-month learning experience. Through prayer, skill-building, action and reflection they address their most pressing questions about the future.

The experience includes three Saturday workshops and ongoing consultation calls with diocesan leaders and coaches Dwight Zscheile (author, *The Agile Church*) and Michael Binder.

- Learn to discern and respond to God's leading.
- Deepen your congregation's spirituality.
- Build connections with other congregations.
- Engage and inspire your membership.
- Affirm your faith that God has a vital role for your congregation to play.

If your congregation is interested in joining the Learning Communities initiative, here is what is required:

- Each congregation will need a Guiding Team of four to six members willing to engage in the three 2018 trainings. (In addition to the Guiding Team, anybody from participating congregations may attend the trainings).
- Each Guiding Team will be responsible to help others from their congregation participate in the activities and learning that will take place between trainings.
- Each vestry will need to discuss and approve their congregation's participation in the Learning Communities initiative.
- Each congregation will be asked to contribute \$40 or less per person per training to cover the cost of meals.

What is a Guiding Team?

Every congregation participating in the Learning Communities initiative will identify a Guiding Team of four to six members. The Guiding Team is the conduit through which the congregation as a whole is invited to participate in the Learning Community. Guiding Team members will receive coaching on how to engage others in their congregations in activities and learning throughout the process. A coach will answer their questions and help them to address challenges that arise during the Learning Communities initiative.

Building a Guiding Team

A participant on the Guiding Team should have the following characteristics/skills:

- Ability to work in cooperation with a team.
- Demonstrated leadership ability in some other context.
- Willingness to experiment with new activities and behaviours the processwill invite.
- Willingness to personally practice some of the spiritual habits introduced in the Learning Communities initiative trainings.
- Ability and willingness to personally invite others in the congregation to participate at different points in the process.
- Commitment to participate in three Saturday trainings as well as all meetings the Guiding Team schedules.
- Commitment to respond to phone calls, emails and other communications related to the process.
- Commitment to enter the process as a learner without a particular agenda other than to follow God's leading for the congregation.
- Guiding Team members together represent the diversity of their congregation in terms of age, ethnicity, gender, and socio-economic status.

Time Commitment

Each Guiding Team Member will commit to:

- Three Saturday training workshops.
- One meeting per month (on average) with members of your Guiding Team to plan activities related to the Learning Communities initiative. Each meeting will likely include time with a coach; time and place will be determined by the Guiding Team.
- Time spent recruiting and training other members of the congregation throughout the process. Skills the Guiding Team will learn, practice and share include listening to God through scripture, interviewing other church members, and walking their neighborhoods with a spiritual focus.
