Dear Friends in Christ,

Who's your favorite saint? Are you a traditionalist favoring those of the first century—Saints Peter, James, John, Mary, Mary and Martha of Bethany or Mary Magdalene? Maybe you favor theologians—Saints Anselm, Martin Luther, John Henry Newman, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Richard Hooker, Karl Barth and Thomas Aquinas? Perhaps you prefer the Celtic Saints Patrick, Bridget or Columba? Or maybe the musical Saints Johann Sebastian Bach, Thomas Tallis, Frederick Handel, and Henry Purcell? Or the poets Saints John Donne and George Herbert? My favorite saint is Saint Joan of Arc, a 15th century mystic who changed the course of France's Hundred Years' War by liberating the siege of Orléans and securing the coronation of Charles VII. Vestry Highlights



- Rector's Report - We started with Dwelling in the Word. We also discussed the model of "Gather-Transform-Send"
- Treasurer's Report – is available in the rack by the bulletin board over the pew in the narthex.
- 2018 Audit was completed by Tom Johnson and presented to the vestry for approval.
- Safe Church Training – All members of our Christian Education staff must be certified in order to teach. We will set up another date ASAP to get them certified.
- Learning Community Initiative – Linda, Missy, Deacon Dorothy and Mother Chris attended the September meeting.
- Scouts – are back in session and will hold a chicken and biscuit dinner as well as selling Christmas trees again as fund raising activities.
- There will be a Tree Trimming Party & Celebration of Mother Chris' 20th anniversary of her ordination on December 15th at the Rectory after the 10:00am service.
- Fund Raising – we have the Cabaret coming up on November 23rd and the Pasta Dinner on December. 14th. We will not be selling the Boscov booklets this year.
- Building and Grounds – we will be reviewing the refrigerator contract as it needs repair.
- Outreach – Soup & Sandwich Lunch numbers are back up, but we are getting some help from the college and from requests for help on Facebook.
- Narcan training – open to anyone interested. The date of training is November 4th.at 5:00pm at All Saints'.
- Diocese and Beyond – Regional meetings are being held this month. Locations will be in Watertown, Fayetteville, Rome and Ithaca. All start at 6:30pm.
- The annual Diocese of Central New York Convention will be on November 8th and 9th at Holiday Inn, Liverpool, NY.
- Next vestry meeting is November 13th at 6:30pm.

We have received some direction from the Vestry to work on how we use time, talent and treasure for the betterment of our parish. A LEARNING COMMUNITY INITIATIVE ACTIVITY




We opened the church on Thursday October 31st for Halloween.

November 2nd and 3rd are the Vigil and Feast Day for All Saints' — our parish's "patronal feast." As we celebrate our patronal feast at the Saturday 5:00pm Holy Eucharist and the Sunday 10:00am Holy Eucharist, it is customary to renew our Baptismal Covenant and remember All Saints': those capital letter saints (St. Paul, etc.) and those lower case saints—loved ones who have died.

As was done last year, in addition to gathering the names of loved ones who have joined the Church Triumphant, All Saints' will have an altar of remembrance during All Saints' weekend upon which small photos of the named loved ones can be displayed.



**MATTHEW
THE APOSTLE AND EVANGELIST**

Some resources say Levi was the original name of the man who was subsequently called Matthew. Originally, a tax collector, Jesus called him to become one of his apostles. He was the writer of "The Gospel according to Saint Matthew" which is the first book in the New Testament. He is symbolized as a winged man because he emphasizes the humanity of Christ. St. Matthew is the patron saint for accountants, bankers, bookkeepers and tax collectors. He is commemorated on September 21st. The liturgical color is RED.



VETERANS DAY



Then God said, “Let us make humankind in our own image, in our likeness, and let them be stewards over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground.” In fact, over everything! (Gen. 1:26 – 28, paraphrase)

We Christians have grown accustomed to hearing preachers tell us that God gave us “dominion” over all of his creation. But I sometimes wonder if we take God seriously. Service members in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard all protect the freedoms we cherish. What are those freedoms? Well, there are the freedoms so nobly expressed by President James Madison in the first ten amendments of the U.S. Constitution, what we call “The Bill of Rights.” Then there are the freedoms President Franklin Delano Roosevelt declared in a major speech during the Great Depression, later immortalized by Norman Rockwell in his “Four Freedoms” paintings: Freedom from want, Freedom of speech, Freedom to Worship, and Freedom from fear. All of these freedoms are encapsulated in the 1949 United Nations Declaration of Human Rights. But what about those freedoms we take for granted or treat as if they are rights: home ownership, jobs, health care, public education, and transportation? Only in America are these blessings all but guaranteed.

We live in an age of “entitlement,” as it’s called. We go about our daily routines in a free and open society, never stopping to think how our lifestyles are secured. Just as the blessed Apostle Paul reminds us that we are not our own, but “were bought with a price,” in reference to the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross (1Corinthians 6:20), so it is that our freedoms as citizens were purchased with the lives of patriots and the blood of warriors who willingly gave up the amenities we enjoy. For this we should be grateful.

With the freedoms come responsibilities. When Adam and Eve were in the garden, their “original sin” came in the form of their choosing willfulness over obedience. They quickly forgot God’s instructions and began to behave as freedom meant license. However, true freedom is God’s service (BCP, 99).

True freedom comes from obedience to the God who makes us stewards over everything, not that we should be dictators or abusers, but servants.



Since the Book Club meets after the deadline for *The Crossways*, and the pace of reading is set by the Book Club members it is impossible to tell if *The Handmaid's Tale* will be finished in October and *The Testaments* begin in November. At any rate, Book Club will be reading one of Margaret Atwood's Gilead books in November. Both books are available in a multitude of printed and digital formats. Here are the publisher's blurbs on both:


"The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood (\$9.87 paperback, \$9.99 e-book)

It is the world of the near future, and Offred is a Handmaid in the home of the Commander and his wife. She is allowed out once a day to the food market, she is not permitted to read, and she is hoping the Commander makes her pregnant, because she is only valued if her ovaries are viable. Offred can remember the years before, when she was an independent woman, had a job of her own, a husband and child. But all of that is gone now...everything has changed."

"The Testaments by Margaret Atwood (\$17.37 hard copy; \$14.99 e-book)

When the van door slammed on Offred's future at the end of *The Handmaid's Tale*, readers had no way of telling what lay ahead for her—freedom, prison or death. With *The Testaments*, the wait is over. Margaret Atwood's sequel picks up the story fifteen years after Offred stepped into the unknown, with the explosive testaments of three female narrators from Gilead."

BEGINNING SUNDAY, DECEMBER 1st: *LIGHT OF
THE WORLD: A BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO ADVENT***

Dive deep into the history of the birth of Christ.

Advent is not only the perfect time to read the story of the birth of Jesus; it's also a great time to dive deeper into the biblical texts that surround the event. In the Advent program *Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent*, author, professor, and biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine shows how the Gospel narratives connect to the Old Testament; highlights the role of women in first-century Jewish culture; and emphasizes the importance of Mary's visitation, the census, the stable, the star of Bethlehem, and the flight to Egypt. It's rich and challenging learning experience a wonderful, four-week Advent group study.

All Saints' will be offering *Light of the World: A Beginner's Guide to Advent* on Sundays at 5 pm beginning December 1st, Advent 1. 


